The AEC In 2006

This year will be "more of the same" – an exciting, expanding programme to help with the education of Indigenous students at all levels. We are in the process of awarding 111 primary, 100 secondary, and up to 15 tertiary scholarships and awards, a record expenditure involving nearly \$90,000. In addition, we are seeking opportunities to provide facilities and equipment to schools with a significant enrolment of Aboriginal students; as well as continuing to financially support the University of Western Sydney's SELF SUPPORT CENTRE, which is researching reasons for lack of self-esteem and self-confidence frequently found in Aboriginal children.

In a nutshell, this is the most progressive and effective program of support for Indigenous students in Australia, and is made possible by the generous support of our donors, and the prudent investment of bequests we have received in recent years.

Whilst we are proud of the AEC's achievements over the past 40-odd years, during which time we have assisted many thousands of students, we have one BIG problem, our Executive Committee consists of people with both educational and business backgrounds, but several of them are long-retired and some have been involved for over 40 years. We need younger people to volunteer their services to ensure the future of the AEC, and the responsible administration of the substantial funds we are now handling. Our Annual General Meeting is scheduled for Monday 27th March, and you will receive your notice, agenda and reports by early March. Please consider becoming a member of the Executive Committee on this occasion, and be a part of the valuable work we are doing.

The AGM will also be an opportunity for members to see our new office, which is situated in the grounds of Alexandria Park Community School. I am sure you will be impressed with the small but modern premises we occupy, and the efficient way the administration is functioning. The location is in Power Avenue, just off Wyndham Street, Alexandria; which is a principal route connecting Sydney Airport with the City.

I am sure members and supporters will wish to join with the members of Executive Committee and staff in offering our deepest sympathy to our President James Wilson-Miller on the sad loss of his oldest son Jamie, following a long illness. The last months or so have been a very sad time for Jamie's family, and our deepest condolences are offered to them all.

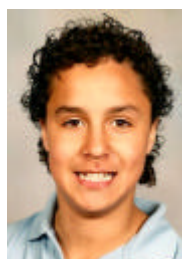

Winnegai means achievement

Mr Greg Chatfield, a Wallawan man of Kamilaroi Wallawan parents, last December presented the inaugural Winnegai Awards at the annual Yass High School Presentation Night. He did so as the guide and mentor of students who had come to know and respect him as a friend and mentor in his role as Aboriginal Schools and Community Liaison Officer.

One of the awardees was year 12 student Mel Hicks who has accepted a place at Canberra University in 2006 and hopes to pursue a Bachelor of Arts with a view to a teaching career.

The principal of Yass High School, Mr Paul Bills, describes Greg as “the best of the best—really outstanding”. He said that in the period Mr Chatfield worked among the four schools, Yass, Berinba and Bowning Public Schools and Yass High, last year very positive things happened. He noticed a real attitudinal change among some students.



At this point there is no indication that Mr Chatfield will be employed by the NSW Department of Education this year despite funding announcements by the Minister for Aboriginal Affairs Milton Orkopolous in early January as well as the support of local principals and the local member, Katrina Hodgkinson. He previously worked under a mix of federal and state government funding through Campbell Page.

Mr Chatfield is very proud of the fact that four Indigenous students will be in Year 12 this year. With his encouragement some young people who have dropped out of school are returning to school this year. He is convinced that students need role models and guidance to help them develop goals and strive to achieve. He says he is prepared to work in a voluntary capacity until he is officially appointed.

Jindabyne Public School

Due to a strong connection between the area and Aboriginal groups that have travelled to Jindabyne for many decades, Jindabyne Public School set about finding ways of acknowledging and building cultural awareness within the school to encourage students, staff and the visiting community to understand and share the importance of their local history.

Western Sydney Region

Project: To employ local Aboriginal artists to provide workshops for students to promote school-community partnerships and address Aboriginal perspectives across the curriculum K-12.

This project is a component of the Bourke Yaamma Festival where students were invited to attend a series of Aboriginal workshops facilitated by young local Indigenous artists. These workshops provide a framework for students' representation of traditional and contemporary issues, where students have the opportunity to explore art-making practices with the local artists.

The project aims to extend core arts curriculum K-6 and visual arts 7-10, extend literacy skills of Aboriginal students K-12, provide activities to engage Aboriginal students, Encourage and support the participation of Aboriginal parents and community members in decisions regarding the planning, delivery and evaluation of pre-school, primary and secondary education services for their children and to increase the number of Aboriginal people employed as teachers' assistants, and other education workers, including community people engaged in teaching Aboriginal Culture, history and contemporary society through art.



Matraville Sports High School

The nature of the project is to form a remote control race club which is a follow-on from a Small Engines' Remote Control race car building program delivered at the school to engage Youth at Risk to stay at school longer. Participants each build remote control petrol driven race cars as part of the program as well as gain knowledge in accredited skills related to tools and Occupational Health and Safety.

Aims and objectives of the project are;- starting, building and maintaining friendships, working individually and part of a team, listening to and understanding instructions and Punctuality – being organised and on time.

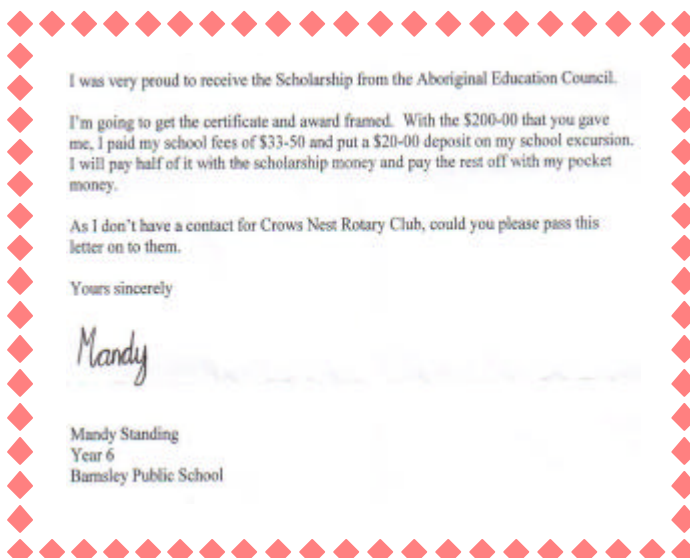
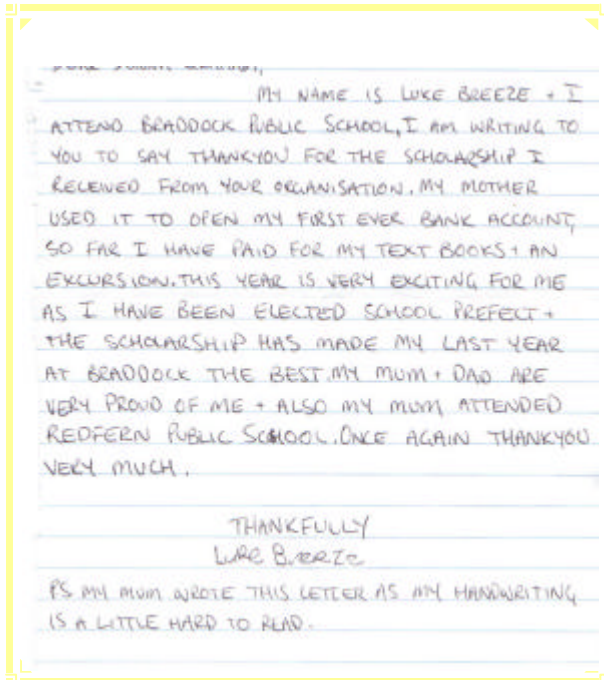
